Thanksgiving

Some years ago, I went to Ghana, Africa to teach at a school for pastors for several weeks. While there, I was hosted by a missionary family. At mealtimes, the host would ask different ones at the table to pray. And one day he asked his 5-year old daughter if she wanted to pray. And excitedly, she did.

She closed her eyes tightly, and enthusiastically began to thank God for her family, then for everything else she could think of; her bed, her doll, her blanket, her tricycle, her shoes, her Sunday dress, her grandpa, the air, the trees, the flowers, the

sky, the orange tree in the yard... And then she was silent. I peeped to see if she was finished, but just forgot the "Amen" clue, but she wasn't done. She had opened her eyes and was looking around. Suddenly, she continued, "And thank you for the table, and the chairs, and the plates, and the glasses, and the water, and the spoons, and the forks, and the sugar, and the salt, and the pepper,

and the toothpicks, and the rice, and the chicken, and the highchair, and the refrigerator, and the flyswatter, and the sink, and the fan, and the clock..." I don't know if anyone had ever thanked God for toothpicks, or a flyswatter, or a sink before. And I know many people who have other words for their clocks early mornings rather than words of thanksgiving. But now that I think about it for a moment, what would our lives be without any of these things?

She must have been listening to me pray a blessing for the food the day before and thought that long prayers were the way to get God's attention, because her prayer went on for a long time.

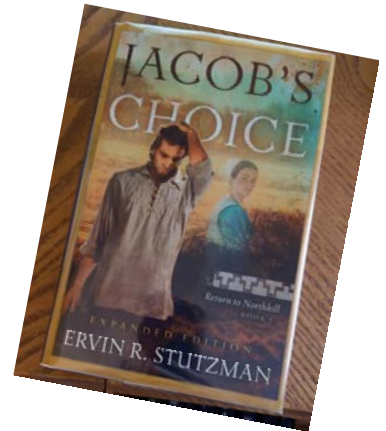

From our Library

This week I'm featuring a book that holds a special place in my heart, **Jacob's Choice** by Ervin Stutzman. It's the first of three in a series, and while they are not all in our library, you'll likely be wanting to read more about the path God laid out for the other members of this family. I've recounted this story many times, but I'll try to just give you an intro and not to give away the whole book...



While technically considered a fictional account, I can say this story mirrors the story that has been handed down in my family for many, many years. You see Jacob was my many times over great grandfather. He and his wife and a few small children came over to the US on the Charming Nancy in 1738 (although some would argue it was another boat with a different woman, I tend to feel that was someone else entirely, and lean to this record instead after further research). A short 19 years later the family became victims of an Indian Massacre which to my understanding is part of Pennsylvania history books to this day. Jacob, being a devout Amish Mennonite man, instructed his son's to put down the hunting musket they wanted to use to defend themselves, as Indians were attacking their home. Their house was set ablaze, and family members were captured, sadly, some were scalped, while others were taken prisoner. This book recounts not just the attack but also Jacob's journey following his capture, and how his adherence to his faith and values stood firm despite his trials and tribulation.

I won't go much farther as I don't want to confuse anything with the other two books. A few years back on TLC's "Who Do You Think You Are", Actress Katy Segal learned that her roots tie back to Jacob, which is not surprising. The Jacob Hochstetler Family Association, based in Goshen, estimates that there are nearly 1 million decedents of Jacob scattered coast to coast. In case you're wondering I personally am one through both of my parents and my mother in law.

But unlike me, she recognized everything around her as a gift from God and wanted to be sure and thank God for it.

At the end of her lengthy prayer, when the adults joined her in opening their eyes, all had smiles on their faces as we began to pass the rice and the chicken and the salt and the pepper. But that little girl taught me something in her prayer. We are surrounded by many things we don't normally consider as gifts from God. Most of them improve our lives in some way, and most of them bring us a degree of happiness, and much of the time we take them for granted. Rarely if ever have I recognized some of the things mentioned in this little girl's prayer as a gift from God, let alone thought of thanking God for them.

That day, I was reminded to thank God for the little things that make life more comfortable and convenient. Especially, I thank God for the little people that sometimes teach big lessons. Thank you, Ariel! Unlike many of my prayers, I shall never forget yours.

There are 2 different packs to choose from

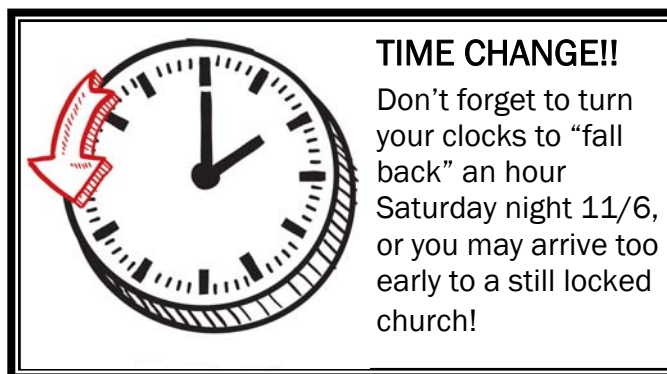
Pack 1
