Worship Preview: The last night Jesus with His disciples, Jesus said some very important things to them. and being crushed in spirit. Their ambitions and dreams were shattered, all joy of being a follower Jesus had just been drained away, and their commitment to Jesus would soon be tested. Jesus said some very curious things that night, too, and it left the disciples wondering, had Jesus lost His mind? Had He decided to abandon His plans for a Kingdom, a kingdom all the disciples longed for? Did Jesus for some reason, loose His powers?

One of the very curious things Jesus said to His disciples that night was that it would be better for them if He went away. How is that possible? What could possibly be better than having Jesus by your side? We can see it now, but the disciples sure couldn't see it. It would be better because Jesus would send the Holy Spirit to replace Himself, and through the work of the Holy Spirit, the disciples would be transformed into very different people. They would soon have new insights, new powers, and a new focus in life.

Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit to live in believers. Most churches today give at least lip service to the presence and work of the Holy Spirit in the lives of believers, although what churches teach about the Holy Spirit varies greatly. Some pay little attention to the indwelling of God's Spirit, while others make having manifestations of the Spirit proof of one's Salvation. Neither position is consistent with what Jesus taught His disciples that night. Churches that emphasize the presence of the Holy Spirit today generally look to the Spirit to provide some esoteric religious experience. This fits our cultural understanding of religion today. We have become consumers of religions, and the Spirit enables us to have great religious experiences with a lot of emotions and enthusiasm. But that is not exactly what Jesus had in mind when He told His disciples that He would send them another "Counselor." Jesus taught that the work of the Holy Spirit in the disciples would be to teach, to transform, to give power, and to lead them. And the Spirit's work in an unbelieving world would be a ministry of conviction.

The work of the Holy Spirit in the lives of believers is essential today. But we would do well to pay attention to what Jesus said that work would entail, and not relegate the Holy Spirit to either a mere theological statement in a Confession of Faith, nor reduce the work of the Spirit to some esoteric experience that just makes me feel good. The entering of the Holy Spirit into the lives of the first disciples made them fearless, gave them new powers, new insights, and made them committed to follow the teachings and example of Jesus. In other words, the work of the Holy Spirit transformed them to be more like Jesus.



Dear FMC Member,

As the Executive Director of the Middlebury Food Pantry, I am reaching out to you because we are currently facing unprecedented challenges that threaten our ability to fulfill our vital role in the community. Over the past year, we have experienced a significant increase in the number of families and individuals seeking assistance from our pantry. This surge in attendance, coupled with the soaring inflation of food costs and a decrease in early year donations, has placed an immense strain on our resources.

In response to these challenges, we have implemented three immediate measures:

Adjusting Food Distribution: We have made the difficult decision to transition from providing six days food to three days, in line with industry standards and national emergency pantry guidelines. While this ad justment allos us to stretch our resources further, it also hightlights the urgency of our situation.

Pantry Diversion Program: through this initiative, individuals have access to online money manage ment classes and resources aimed at building financial literary and independence. By investing in education and support services, we are working towards breaking the cycle of poverty and hunger in our community.

Collaborative Partnerships: We have found alliances with multiple agencies and suppliers to negotiate favor able terms and reduce our food costs by over \$50,000 annually

Despite these efforts, the reality is that we cannot sustain our operations without the generous support of donors like you. Your contribution, no matter the size will make a tangible difference in the lives of those who rely on us for essential sustenance and support. Your donation will help us purchase nutritious food items, maintain our programs, and ensure that no one in our community goes to bed hungry.

Than you for your unwavering commitment to our mission. Together, we can make a difference and ensure that no one faces hunger alone.
