Worship Preview: We welcome Goshen College's Worship Ensemble, "Parables" to First Mennonite Church on Sunday. The theme of their presentation this year is "Walk in the Light." Parables uses music, drama, and Scripture in their presentation.

Music is an important part of most people's lives. Whether they feel they can sing or not, most people try, and even if they are shy to sing when other are around, most like to listen to music. We are created with the ability to both make music and to enjoy music. The truth is, most people like to sing and make music, and we do so with various degrees of skills and refinement. And like most things in life, the degree to which we focus on music and dedicate ourselves to practice and refine our skills, the better we become at it.

Music is a vital part of our worship. Music is one of the important ways we express our faith in worship. In worship, we listen to God's Word, we give our tithes and offerings, we declare our dependence on God when we pray, but when we sing, our love for God and our declarations of faith gush from our hearts with feeling and emotion. Music has tremendous powers, as it engages not only our intellect, but our emotions and our imaginations. One of the most fascinating things in the recent study of dementia, is that people who suffer from that dreaded disease, almost always retain their memory of music. Perhaps music is lodged in a part of the brain that is not affected by dementia, or perhaps music interacts with the brain in a different way than our other forms of learning that fade with dementia.

Music has always been a very important part of worship of God. Very early in the Bible, we find Miriam's Song, and Moses' Song, and other songs, and generally, these are accompanied with dancing and celebration. It is significant that the largest book in the Bible is a collection of songs and hymns. Psalms was the Hebrew song book. I am so glad that these have been rediscovered, and at least some of modern worship music is singing of the Psalms. It is also worth noting, that in the worship scenes in the Book of Revelation, there is music, and a lot of it. And sometimes with the note, the singers are singing a "new song," a song of redemption, but it is always a song directed to God that flows from grateful hearts in praise and worship of God.
